## *Lisa Fernandez - Bio*

She returns to the coaching ranks after taking two years away from the U.S. National team for the birth of her son, Antonio, and playing competitively as part of the launch of the PFX Tour during the summer of 2006.

Fernandez was one of five former Bruins to play on the 1996 gold medal winning United States Olympic Team, and one of six Bruins included on the active roster for the gold medal winning 2000 squad. As the top pitcher and hitter in the tournament, Fernandez led Team USA to a third consecutive Gold Medal in 2004 in Athens, Greece. She remains the only player in the history of Olympic softball to be the winning pitcher in a Gold Medal game, and her .545 batting average (12-for-22) was a new record high for an Olympic tournament.

During USA Softball's 2002 pre-Olympic "Central Park to Sydney" Tour, Fernandez pitched five consecutive perfect games, including a game in which she struck out all 21 batters. In Sydney, Fernandez posted a 0.47 ERA with 52 strikeouts, 13 of which came in the one-hitter she threw against host Australia, a 1-0 victory that put USA Softball in the gold medal game.

In 1996, Fernandez shined in Team USA's 3-1 gold medal victory over China, recording the final three outs to earn a save and secure the Gold Medal. In the 2000 Sydney Games, Fernandez pitched the U.S. to victory in both the semifinal win over Australia and in the gold medal game against Japan.

In 1999, Fernandez was named the Amateur Softball Association/USA Softball Female Athlete of the Year. As a pitcher and third baseman, she helped the USA Softball Women's National Team to gold medals at both the Pan American Games and the Canada Cup. She also helped the California Commotion win the ASA Women's Major Fast Pitch championship for the fourth consecutive time. Fernandez played at UCLA from 1990-93 and completed her psychology degree in 1995. A three-time winner of the sport's Honda Award, Fernandez became the first softball player to win the prestigious Honda-Broderick Cup, given to the most outstanding collegiate female athlete in all sports, earning the honor in 1993. A four time All-American, Fernandez led the Bruins to two national championships (1990 & 1992) and two runner-up finishes (1991 & 1993).

A talented pitcher who also wielded a powerful bat, Fernandez rewrote the UCLA record books for season and career accomplishments as both a pitcher and hitter. In her junior and senior seasons, she earned the NCAA's best ERA (0.14 in 1992, 0.25 in 1993) and added the NCAA batting crown her senior year (.510). More than a decade after her final collegiate game, Fernandez continues to have a presence in the NCAA Division I record book. She ranks second in career ERA and winning percentage and ninth in shutouts.
